## Saskatoon woman cycles for mental health

Dulle takes action against Canada's mental health crisis.

**∀**ycling across Canada, Jade's Ride for Mental Health stopped overnight in Virden on June 25. Jade Dulle of Saskatoon, Sask. is cycling from Pince Rupert, B.C. to St. John's, Newfoundland on a mission to make legislators aware of the dire need for changes in mental health assessment and treatment in Canada.

Taking the Yellow Head route through Jasper she'd seen 20 bears on her travels. On through the Prairies she's met with encouraging people, Kenton's Val Caldwell (also a mental health advocate) being just one such person.

As a teen, Dulle had visited emergency services 19 times, trying to hold onto reality while experiencing auditory and visual hallucinations, only to be told there was nothing the team there could do for her and a psychiatristwas a six-month wait away.

Adecade later, at 28, with a Bachelor of Social Work obtained in 2022, Dulle is cycling across Canada gatheringsupportforbetter treatments for psychiatric conditions.

Dulle's story is unique since not one, but both her birth parents suffered from schizophrenia. Yet, psychiatric disorders are all too common; 5 million Canadians are living with mental illnesses and fully a third of them report unmet or partially unmet needs in three categories: medication, information and counselling.

With her biological par-

entsaffected by schizophrenia, she was separated from her mum shortly after birth and was shuffled through foster homes until, at the age of two, an amazing family adopted her as their

Dulle says she was a good student and an athlete through her growing years. But in her late teens symptoms began to bother her, and she sought help.

Despite persistent pleas for help over the years, she'd been "repeatedly turned away, caught in the labyrinth of insufficient resources, inaccessible services, and overflowing psychiatric

"On Aug. 5, 2023, my journey took a pivotal turn as I was finally admitted to the hospital after enduring almost a decade of mental health struggles.

"Following my admission, a new chapter of hope began. After years of grappling with my mental health concerns, I received a diagnosis of PTSD and depression. However, the treatment was private, requiring me to bear the costs out of pocket.

"In the fall of 2023, I embarked on a transformative journey of psychotherapy and ketamine therapy. These experiences were nothing short of life-altering. Through my healing journey, I came to a profound realization: it's not that people don't want to get better; it's the scarcity of resources that obstruct their path to healing."

This spring, May 6, Dulle embarked on a cross-Canada journey (7,000 km) to advocate for a better mental health system.

"Empowered by my recovery, I found clarity in my life's purpose. I was granted the gift of healing so that I could become a voice for change."

She's advocating for legislation to create a Canadian standard of care to guide psychiatric health care in the provinces.

Calvin and Tracey Dulle, her parents, have been behindhereffort, taking turns as her travelling team. Her extended family, and it's a large one, has also rallied behind her.

The travelling van is another story of blessing. Supportive of her idea, a Canadian veteran re-


sponded to Dulle's search for a vehicle to use on her Canadian cycle. He told her he had healed in his van from PTSD and wanted to see others also heal. He'd turned a work van into living quarters.

"It's perfect," says Dulle. This is her second and much longer ride. In 2017 she raised \$25,000 for the Canadian Mental Health Association - Saskatoon Branch cycling over 1,300 kms through Saskatch-

Among a number of othersponsors, herphysical fitness trainer with Rise Strength Lab in Saskatoon stays in contact throughout her trip, providing mind, body and spirit support. Poppey Supplements sponsors her extensive nutritional regime and she's careful to maintain her electrolyte balance throughout the

That evening in Virden and not yet half-way across the continent, Dulle had gathered over 8,000 signatures toward her goal of 10,000, a number that will get the attention of politicians when she brings this cause to the House of Commons in Ottawa.

ormer US President Ronald Reagan said once, "The nine most feared words in the English language are, I'm here from the government and I'm here to help."



## Road trip!

y Sister the Younger had the misfortune to break her arm some time ago, and so I have tried to slip over to Carman every couple of weeks and have lunch with her. One week I decided to use different routes coming and going: see something different, check on crops and moisture conditions. I followed Highway 16 down to Highway 1 and continued south to St Claude rather than go through Portage. I would certainly nominate that section of road for the award of most potholes per mile in the province, perhaps the nation! So I slowed down and appreciated the scenery. It was wet. And the closer I got to sandier land the more I noted drifting soil right around water filled sloughs and low spots. No need for the irrigation system to be working. Turning west at St Claude I envisioned the worst of the road conditions behind me. Nope. Construction. Pilot vehicle. Flag people. All the standard Manitoba summer road conditions. No problem, I had given myself adequate travel time, my sister wouldn't be worrying. Again, very wet fields, some hay wrapped and some silage started. Turning south at Elm Creek I was close to target time. Dang, a couple of miles out all travel was directed off the highway, an incident had required a detour. Again, no problem, I know the area. Okay, now you have all the transports, B trains, on a country gravel road. Dust enough to choke you, and slow travel as the semis with their loads maneuvered tight corners and carefully met each other, no one really wanting to take the soft shoulder. As the majority of the traffic headed back to the highway I continued a mile further south before returning to the pavement. Again, knowing the area gave me that confidence. Without the traffic and the dust I could crop and water watch. I was only 15 minutes late.

So, to return home I decided to head north from Carman to Highway One and then on to Carberry and home. Here again, timing was everything. The rail crossing in Headingly was under repair, so ALL east bound traffic on Highway One was re-routed at Oakville, Highway 13, travelling south to Elm Creek before going east to Winnipeg. So take ALL the traffic off of a main artery and funnel it down a two-lane highway, and there was mile after mile of end to end vehicles: campers, U Hauls, big rigs and the impatient ones. It was mind numbing. I was ever so thankful to be meeting them rather than trying to merge with them. The turn at the Elm Creek corner was painful to witness...

After that it was clear sailing. A little bit of construction just after entering the Trans Canada, but the traffic was orderly and considerate. And again, the fields were wet. Early crops, especially the fall sown crops, look ok, there may be spots that will yellow yet, but right now they look pretty good. As a farmer's daughter, and a long time farmer's wife, I'd say we have had enough rain for now, and don't need blistering heat. I already know which route I'll choose next time.



pletely determine when tea first became known as something people could drink. It's likely that the first plants that tea was made from originated in China, Tibet, and Northern India. When tea first started to be made, it was used solely for its medicinal properties, not just as a drink for people to enjoy. Tea first became popular in China during the Tang Dynasty, its popularity evident by the government's imposition of a tax on tea.

Tea first started to be imported by Europeans in the 17th century, although explorers often had it earlier, Marco Polo made reference to tea in his journals about his travel to the East. Tea didn't become a more common thing until Dutch merchants started shipping it around 1610, bringing in Japanese and Chinese tea through the Dutch East India Company. Tea quickly became popular throughout large European cities like Amsterdam, London, and Paris. However, tea had a high price, making it available mainly to Europe's royal classes and aristocracy. Drinking tea also allowed wealthy European's to take part in an Eastern tradition during the age of exploration and discovery.

Tea first arrived in America during the 1600's, also brought by the Dutch to New Amsterdam. When the English took over the new colony, it became New York. The tea trade between England the colony was strong, but the English heavily taxed the tea. Eventually, this led to the Boston Tea Party, where colonists dumped tea into the water after boarding the East India Company's trading boats.

Iced tea originated in 1904 at the World's Fair in St. Louis, Missouri. A tea merchant started selling hot brewed tea with ice in it due to the unusually hot temperatures, and it became a huge hit, as iced tea is

now extremely popular in the USA.

Tea caddies are containers used to store tea, made popular during the time when tea was extremely expensive. The earliest tea caddies made were of China porcelain, brought to Europe with the tea. Due to how expensive tea was, expert craftsmen were hired to design and build ornate tea caddies out of wood, brass, copper, and other metals. Tea caddies became a sort of symbol of wealth, designed ornately to fit in with other decorations in the household. Tea caddies also often had locks on them, made to protect the precious tea that they contained.

Tea has been an important resource throughout much of history, from being a precious rarity to being a daily drink consumed by people all over the world, tea certainly did its part in shaping its own little piece of history.

### Westman RCMP Service Report for June 23 – June 29, 2024

During this week Westman RCMP received a total of 63 calls for service. Of the 63, 12 were Traffic Related including 7 Moving Traffic – Speeding Violations, 4 Suspicious Person/Vehicle/Property, and 5 Mischieffiles.

On June 25 RCMP were dispatched to a domestic assault that had taken place at a residence in Sioux Valley Dakota Nation. Police attended and learned that female had been assaulted by her boyfriend, who had since left the residence. After making multiple attempts to locate the suspect, a warrant has been issued for a 24-year old male in relation to this incident.

On June 27 during a routine traffic patrol on Highway 1 in the RM of Sifton, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 148 km/hr in a 110 km/hr zone. A traffic stop was conducted and the driver was issued a Traffic Offence Notice for Speeding which carries a fine of \$548.

On June 28 during a routine traffic patrol on Highway 257 in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 140 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. A traffic stop was conducted and the driverwas issued a Traffic Offence Notice for Speeding which carries a fine of \$573.

On June 29 RCMP initiated a traffic stop on in 3rd Avenue in the Town of Virden. Police spoke to a female driver who admitted to consuming alcohol the day prior. Abreath sample was obtained at the scene, which resulted in a FAIL. As a result, the driver was arrested and charged with Operation while Impaired (Alcohol) of Motor Vehicle, and Operation while over 80mg% (Alcohol) of Motor Vehicle. A Breath Test was conducted with results of 100mg% and 90mg%. The 54-year old female was later released on an Appearance Notice and will appear in court later this summer.

He said their teachers had "worked their butts off" to prepare them to graduate, to have the skills to go out into the world and be leaders and create more leaders.

He reminded the class that their opportunities at VCI included an "amazing amount of scholarships," provided by the surrounding communities, businesses and individuals.

"Being in Swift Current for three years before they would only usually be able to watch me in Brandon," Lewis said. "While playing in Virden, I had the opportunity to play every home game in front of the people closest to me."

He greatly appreciated the support his family has provided over the years.

"They've been everything to me," Lewis said. "I'm not in the position I am today without all of the sacrifices they've made for me. They mean the world to me

and it's hard to put into words the amount of appreciation I have for my family."

They, of course, will continue to support him when he heads east for the fall. Lewis chose St. Catharines' Brock University because his main focus when deciding where to attend school was to find a new experience.

"Playing hockey in the Western Hockey League, I was able to see all over the western side of the country. Leaving the eastern side as a so called unseen area for me," Lewis said. "The main draw to Brock was the area it is located and the new facilities they have for both the hockey team and students. I also have an ex-teammate (Broncos) who plays there, Rylan Thiessen. 





# Changes coming to chemical container recycling

At their regular meeting on June 25, the RM of Wallace-Woodworth council discussed changes to provincial regulations that will see the recycling of agricultural chemical containers move away from municipal facilities to be managed by the companies that sell these products. Cleanfarms, a non-profit environmental stewardship organization has been working to make these changes over the past three years and Wallace-Woodworth is one of the last municipalities to complete the transition. Council expressed concern over the new system and wondered if the changes would result in fewer containers being recycled.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS

Wallace-Woodworth and Ellice-Archie will each contribute 50 per cent of the cost of a culvert project on road 72N on the boundary between the two municipalities.

Tutthill Construction will perform a culvert upgrade on road 174W which marks the provincial boundary with Saskatchewan.

Due to a grader breakdown council approved payment to Cochrane Stock Farms of \$30,397 for rental of a grader, and \$127,178 to Brandt Tractor for repair of the municipal 2028 JD 772G grader.

#### **KENTON LUD**

The committee met on June 13 at the Kenton Council Chambers. Coun. Diana MacDonald reported they discussed derelict and unsightly property in town.

A section of sidewalk is crumbling and residents have agreed that the sidewalk should be removed.

Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure have installed two of the highway signs directing travelers to the campground with more planned.

There is a large hole in the pavement near the post office that needs repair.

The Lifeline response system that provides automated reporting of emergencies for seniors, such as if the wearer falls is transitioning to wireless operation. This could cause problems for Kenton users due to the limited cellular service in the community.

#### **ELKHORN LUD**

Coun. Denis Lachapelle reported from the LUD committee meeting that plans were progressing for the Canada Day celebration and the Manitoba Antique Automobile Museum (MAAM) event.

Road and sidewalk repairs are in progress and Ryder Kyle has been hired for a student position in town.

#### COUNCILLOR REPORTS

Coun. Val Caldwell reported from Prairie Gateway Tourism (PGT) that there will be a best burger competition from July 22 to 28, with 12 restaurants participating. The PGT website is being updated and Caldwell says, "It's very user friendly, very appealing and I'm very impressed

with it. An excellent website." She noted that PGT had asked the Virden Indoor Rodeo committee for permission to have a booth on the concourse at TOGP during the event, but was denied. There will be a historic walking tour at 10 a.m. on July 26 starting at the CP station in Virden.

Coun. MacDonald reported that the Wallace District Fire Department received a grant of \$20,000 from the Virden Area Foundation.

Reeve Clayton Canart reported that construction of the third municipal water supply well in the Assiniboine valley is in progress. He suggested to the contractors that once that well is ready to be brought online there should be a delay in taking the existing wells offline to allow time to test the new system.

Coun. Mark Humphries reported from the Border Regional Library meeting where discussion continued regarding renovation plans for the Virden branch. The committee found that funds were not available to include all desired upgrades and a priority list was established to ensure that the most important components of the project will be completed first.

The McAuley branch has been moved to the former McAuley school.
