In mid-October, the choir will be boarding the bus and starting their tour of communities in the Westman area.





n October 6, the Christmas in the Country Tradeshow was held at the Reston Rec Plex. Vendors came from all over to enjoy an afternoon at this market. Some drove for up to six hours just to be at the Reston Christmas show. A total of 43 booths were set up in the Rec Plex. About 220 people came out to shop the market.

For thirteen years, Krystle Knelsen has arranged the Reston Christmas Market in Reston. She has been in charge of the project since the beginning and has done all the organizing by herself for the last few years.

The first year of the show, there were 19 tables set up at the theatre. It was realized very quickly that they were going to need more room, which is why the event is now held at the Reston Rec Plex. A person can get a good head start on their Christmas shopping with gorgeous handmade jewelry, beautiful carved woodwork pieces, and perfect stitched or crocheted doll clothes,

kitchen and winter items. Some homemade fudge, bread, cupcakes and more could be found for the avid shopper to take home for a snack for later. There was something for everyone.

The Reston Dance Club and Reston Nursery School, both non-profit groups, worked with Krystle to prepare the market and have helped for years. Members of both groups help with set-up before the event and help the vendors bring in their product for the show on Sunday morning. During the market, the Reston Dance Club worked the front door collecting the

\$5 admission, selling 50/50 draw tickets and having people sign up for the door prize. The Reston Nursery School work the canteen serving chili, sandwiches and a choice of six different delicious desserts including Chocolate Lasagna. All proceeds earned were split evenly between the two organizations for the dance kids and nursery kids.

So many items were donated by the different vendors to the front door prize that Krystle split the door prize into three prizes and three winners received a gift for attending the trade show.

To date, the show has donated \$29,000 to local nonprofit groups.

changed in our municipality.

Cheryl Christian is from West St. Paul where she has worked for her community for many years in different roles including as the mayor. She has been in community leadership for over 20 years. She ran for council because she felt that the biggest problem the government has is lack of communication. She was a teacher at the

University of Manitoba. After her time on council and as mayor, Cheryl decided she wanted to help other municipalities with their strategic plan.

Her visit to the Wallace-Woodworth communities was to discuss the importance of strategic planning, the process that is taking place, the timeline and the next steps. Basically, between the focus group meetings, the surveys she has been collecting from each town, the meetings she has been having with council members and talking to the people she meets in the community, Cheryl will collect all the data and create a plan for the RM of Wallace-Woodworth to move forward with improvements to our communities.

Cheryl did explain right away that this had nothing to do with Plan 20-50.

The focus group was set to concentrate on what the community considers their priorities to improve our communities. The group that attended the meeting had the chance to speak their mind about what they would like to see changed. The number one concern in the Kenton community was road infrastructure.

It was communicated to Cheryl and the AAO of RM of Wallace-Woodworth, Iris Vercaigne, that one of the largest concerns is the condition of the rural roads in the area. There is a miscommunication as to when a member of the community reports bad road conditions to the RM and the RM showing a list of the roads that have been brought to their attention and their plan to repair them. The concern was communication between the people of the community and the RM of Wallace-Woodworth office about the plan.

Other concerns presented were:

1) Having all homes

on public water works, which has not been completed.

- 2) Equipment being replaced for our firefighters because of age instead of use. An unnecessary expense.
- 3) Volunteer firefighters being made to fundraise for new equipment when they are volunteers.
- 4) Poor cellular service, making it difficult to attract new businesses to the area or commuters to want to live in the area.
- 5) Pest control, specifically gopher control causing major crop destruction.
- 6) Employment opportunities-more businesses in the area to employee more people to want to move and or stay in the area.

If roads are not taken care of it affects helping our communities grow. Why would someone move to our area if the commute to work is terrible, if the snow clearing takes a week to complete, if school buses cannot pick up children or ambulances cannot reach homes due to damaged roads.

Having this plan will help the RM of Wallace-Woodworth approach the government for various grants to improve our communities by showing them the research behind the choices our communities are making, whether it is for better roads, additional schools, housing developments, improvements to recreation centres or driving more businesses to step up in our area.

## 55 years in the making



October 7-11, 2024 is Canadian Malnutrition Awareness Week. This year's theme is: ACT - Advocate - Collaborate - Transform. This theme focuses on strategies to advocate for better nutrition care across healthcare settings.

One example of improve nutrition care is the recent purchase of a metabolic cart for patients at the Brandon Regional Health Center. The dietitians advocated purchasing this new equipment and collaborated with physicians and management to write a proposal. It was approved and purchased by the BRHC Foundation, trans-

forming nutrition care for acute care patients. It gives the Dietitian an accurate measure of a patient's nutrition needs. This allows the Dietitians to prescribe the best nutrition plan and plays a role in getting patients better and home sooner.

Another group that can benefit from ACT is older adults living in the community where 1 how we can ACT and in 3 are at nutrition risk. Advocate if they notice loss of appetite, frailty, or mental health issues. If these signs are present, collaborate with health care providers such as Doctors, Nurses, and Dietitians. With help addressing these issues, their life can be transdependence, immunity remember to ACT!

ACT is important with children, too. Up to 1 in 3 children admitted to hospital are malnourished. If you have a child in hospital, advocate by asking if weight, height or length (and head circumference in children under two years old) have been checked. When you go home, collaborate with the healthcare team Family and friends can and ask for a nutrition plan. Ask to meet with weight or muscle loss, a Dietitian if you need help or have questions. This can transform your child's experience by improving growth and recovery and possibly resulting in a shorter stay in hospital.

## **Every Vaccine Counts!** PMH, it is time to get vaccinated

We are heading into Respiratory virus season. Respiratory viruses are common and tend to spread more easily during cooler weather when Manitobans spend more time indoors with others. Influenza (Flu) and Covid viruses are contagious and can have similar and overlapping symptoms.

The BEST ways to reduce your risk and potential complications:

Get vaccinated, stay home when sick, wash your hands frequently, cover your cough/ sneeze, and wear a mask in high-risk situations.

This respiratory virus season, updated Covid and Flu vaccine doses are recommended for all Manitobans 6 months and older. It is especially important for individuals who are considered high risk, those over the age of 65, and children under 5 years of age.

Manitoba Health offers Pneumococcal and High-Dose Flu vaccines to people 65 years and older.

In 2023/24, approximately 25 per cent of the population received flu vaccines and 19 per cent received COVID-19 vaccines. A significantly higher rate was seen in the 65+ age group (54 per cent for COVID-19 and 60 per cent for flu). This year, our goal is



to prevent missed opportunities and reach those individuals at risk for severe illness sooner. We will offer vaccines at more access points; more providers will be offering vaccines.

You can get your Flu, Covid and Pneumococcal vaccines at a local community clinic, pharmacy, or your Primary Care Provider. All vaccines can be given safely at the same visit. It is recommended to receive your Covid vaccine 6 months since your last dose. Talk to your healthcare provider to

determine the best time to vaccinate you.

Prairie Mountain Health (PMH) Flu and Covid Vaccine Clinics will start October 24. Starting October 5 visit our website for a full list of flu/COVID vaccine clinics and locations throughout the region or follow us on our Social Media pages (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter).

# Two charged for assaulting each other

## Westman RCMP Report for Sept. 29 – Oct. 5

During this week Westman RCMP received a total of 96 calls for service. Of these, 33 were traffic related including 12 speeding violations. Also included in the calls for service were 8 suspicious person/ vehicle/property files, 6 assault files, 3 wellbeing checks, 5 false alarms, 5 fire prevention act files, 7 mischief files, and 2 uttering threats against a person file.

On Sept. 29 during a routine traffic patrol in Virden, RCMP observed a male driver using his cellular telephone while driving. A traffic stop was conducted, and this driver was issued a traffic offence notice for using a cell phone or other hand-operated electronic device while driving, which carries 3-day license suspension penalty, as well as a \$672 fine.

On Sept. 30 during a

routine traffic patrol in Melita, a traffic stop was conducted. A 46-year-old man was arrested and charged with driving a motor vehicle while impaired and while over 80mg% alcohol. A breath test was conducted with results of 110mg% and 90mg%. He was released on an appearance notice and will appear in court in November. His vehicle was impounded for 30 days, and license suspended for 3 months.

On Oct.1, RCMP received a report of an abandoned 911 call/ hang up where an unknown female was calling from an unknown location for an assault in progress. RCMP investigated and determined the whereabouts of the assault, and that both parties involved had assaulted one another. As a result, a 19-year-old male was charged with assault. He will be appearing in court in December. An 18-year-old female was also charged with assault,

and she too will appear in court in December.

On Oct. 1, during a routine traffic patrol on Highway 257 in the RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RCMP observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Radar confirmed a speed of 135 km/hr in a 100 km/hr zone. A traffic stop was conducted, and the driver was issued a speeding ticket which carries a fine of \$508.

2 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

1 cup large flake rolled oats

1 cup dark brown sugar

3/4 cup flour

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 cup butter

1/3 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Whipped cream

Preheat the oven to 350 F. Lightly grease a 13X9 inch baking dish. Whisk together the pumpkin puree, cream, milk, sugar, eggs and pumpkin pie spice, in a large bowl until well blended. Add to the prepared pan. In another large bowl, combine the oats, brown sugar, flour and cinnamon. Melt the butter and stir into the flour mixture until it is crumbly. Add the desired nuts. Sprinkle over the first layer. Bake for around 50 minutes or until the crumble is a nice golden brown and set in the middle. Serve room temperature or slightly warm with whipped cream.

Pumpkin pudding

This easy pumpkin recipe is perfect for Thanksgiving dessert! A rich and creamy pumpkin pudding with all the flavor of pumpkin pie and none of the fussy pastry crust.

1 398 mL can pumpkin puree

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

2 Tbsp. molasses

1 heaping Tbsp. flour

1 1/4 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. ginger

1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/2 tsp. salt

3 large eggs, slightly beaten

1 3/4 cups half-and-half, or light cream or milk

Put all the ingredients in a blender. Pour into a casserole dish. Bake at 350 F for 55 to 65 minutes, or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. The pudding may also be baked in individual baking dishes or ramekins. Place the ramekins in a larger pan and fill it with boiling water to a depth of about 1 inch. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes, or until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean.

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

Between ear infections and sleeplessness and coughing and runny noses and endless laundry I found myself complaining, and if I'm being brutally honest, ungrateful.

But I was truly stopped in my ungratefulness as I watched the footage of the flooding and damage from hurricane Helene and in the midst of the heartbreak, the fear now with the impending hurricane Milton.

It was a stark reminder to me that the things that annoy me and the things I complain about, should not be.

So today I just want to take a moment, to take pause, and to hold space for all those that have storm prepped, evacuated, and are starting over again.

For those that came home to their homes destroyed only to turn back around to evacuate again. For those who have lost loved ones who may never be recovered. For those who can't evacuate and are praying desperately on their knees for safety. For those that have had to ration their food and water for their children because they are stranded and don't know when help is coming. Today I am on my knees praying for you, my heart breaking with yours.

Today I am reminded, as this horror unfolds in our neighbouring country, that my house still stands, my loved ones are alive and around me, my children are safe, I have food and water, I have electricity and heat. My complaints should not be complaints at all.

As the world watches and waits, as we hold our breath, as Florida braces for yet another devastating impact. As those sitting in vehicles, grid locked on the highway, praying they make it out before the surge hits. As the elderly, the sick, those without means to evacuate sit and pray. I am reminded of the power of prayer and Gods sovereignty in ALL circumstances. I am reminded that he brings out the best in people during hard times, he brings them together to help one another.

For every devastating video I have watched this week, I've seen one of people on horseback rescuing families, hauling in supplies. I've seen helicopters air rescuing people and animals, dropping cases of water to people who's roads have washed out.

So today, whether you believe in God or not, whether you pray regularly or not, whether you are watching this unfold or not, please take a moment to send up a prayer, a thought, a kind word for those walking through unthinkable circumstances. When you open your eyes, I want you to look around you and count your blessings, be reminded that your home is standing, your family is safe, you have food and water and to be filled with an undeniable sense of gratitude.

### **Notice of Public Hearing**

#### To Review Maximum Allowable Charges And Fees For Payday Loans and The Government Cheque Cashing Fee Tariff

PURSUANT to subsection 164.1(1) of The Consumer Protection Act (Act) (C.C.S.M. c. C200) (the Act), the minister of finance may, at any time, seek the advice and recommendations of the board with respect to any matter relating to the regulation of payday lenders or payday loans.

In accordance with the request of the minister, the Manitoba Public Utilities Board (Board) will conduct a public hearing to review charges and fees for payday loans and consider the impacts of possibly reducing the maximum allowable rate from \$17 per \$100 borrowed to \$14 per \$100 borrowed. On Dec. 23, 2023, the federal government released draft regulations to cap the maximum cost of borrowing for payday loans at

14 per cent of the loan value. The Board will also consider the impacts of reducing the proportion of a borrower's net pay, which is used to determine the maximum loan amount, from 30 per cent to 25 per cent.

In addition to the review of payday loans, the Board will review and make recommendations to the minister regarding the maximum fee any person may charge in Manitoba to cash a government-issued cheque. The current maximum fee is \$3 plus two per cent of the face value of the cheque.

These considerations, and other related matters, will be included in the Board's recommendations report to the minister.

Interveners may also wish to make written submissions regarding the scope of the review and to address any specific issues, beyond the mandatory review requirements that they seek to have the board consider.

All material filed by approved Interveners, as well as public presentations, will be provided on the board's website.

#### **Procedure**

The board's Rules of Practice and Procedure will apply to the conduct of these hearings. All Interveners must familiarize themselves with the board's requirements. 



2 cups pumpkin puree 3/4 cup heavy cream

1/2 cup granulated sugar

o you attend a yearly Fall Supper? Or is it a Fowl Supper? Such community events are enjoyed in Canada and elsewhere, sometimes by other names, and fowl may not be on the menu.

Expressing gratitude is a healthy human trait that has existed from time immemorial. Food is so basic that the fall /fowl supper or the Thanksgiving meal has a long tradition that makes room for all cultures in Canada.

The first official Thanksgiving in Canada was celebrated on Nov.6, 1879, but Indigenous peoples in Canada have a history of celebrating the fall harvest that predates the arrival of European settlers. (D. Mills, "Thanksgiving in Canada". The Canadian Encyclopedia, www. thecanadianencyclopedia.ca)

Sir Martin Frobisher and his creware credited as the first Europeans to celebrate a Thanksgiving ceremony in North America, in 1578. They were followed by the inhabitants of New France under Samuel de Champlain in 1606. The celebration featuring the uniquely North American turkey, squash and pumpkin was introduced to Nova Scotia in the 1750s and became common across Canada by the 1870s. In 1957, Thanksgiving was proclaimed an annual event to occur

on the second Monday of October. It is an official statutory holiday in all provinces and territories except Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia.

Feasting has long been a cornerstone of human culture, transcending borders, religions, and centuries. Whether it's a holiday celebration, a religious ritual, or a family gathering, the cultural significance of feasting runs deep, symbolising more than just the sharing of food.


Itbringspeople together, markslife's milestones, and often serves as a powerful expression of community, identity, and tradition.



## NDP's first year in office defined by dysfunction

WINNIPEG — As Wab Kinew's NDP government marks its first

anniversary, Manitobans are let down by diminished economic growth, escalating healthcare delays, decreased public safety, and dysfunctional leadership.

"On all fronts, the NDP are not as advertised," said Ewasko. "All Manitobans have to do is ask themselves: Am I better off today than I was a year ago? Is life more affordable? Do I feel safer in my community?"

Now 365 days later, there has been no change and Manitobans are feeling even less safe in their communities, with a majority saying that they are worried about crime and public safety. Among Winnipeggers, 66% believe crime is worse now in Manitoba's capital than one year ago.

The NDP ran on "fixing" healthcare, but one year later, Manitobans are waiting longer for care. Nearly 90% of Manitobans believe that the province's healthcare system is not of good quality, a significant increase from June 2023.

"Instead of focusing on improving life for Manitobans, Kinew's NDP spent the last year making life better for themselves, leveraging government resources to boost their popularity," said Ewasko. "Our PC team will continue to hold them to account and shine a light on their failures as they rake in hundreds of millions in new taxes, double the taxpayer-funded political subsidy for their party, force workers to unionize, and hike the gas tax and your Hydro bills at the cabinet table."


At the age of 42 years Helen achieved her GED and returned to school to take her hairdressing, graduating at the top of her class.

## Kenton kicks off playground plans

## Municipality of Wallace-Woodworth October 8 council meeting

The Kenton Community Park Project will be working with Kenton Community Enterprises (KCE) who have charitable status. KCE will manage donations, and the project will be called Woodworth Legion Playground Project. The RM are in full support of the project.

Work on the Ward 2 municipal shop is nearly complete with the final details of construction being wrapped up and yard work ongoing. A small quantity of 2-inch minus aggregate material is required and council approved the payment of \$9376.50 to Sparks Sand and Gravel for hauling the material from the municipal pit.

Reeve Clayton Can-

art and Assistant CAO Iris Vercaigne were authorized to sign the water connection services agreement between the RM of Wallace-Woodworth and the Elkhorn Curling Club.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS

The joint council meeting of the Town of Virden and the RM of Wallace-Woodworth will be held on Nov. 18.

The Safe Work Manitoba conference will be held Oct. 23 in Winnipeg with Cole Delaurier, Christine Volk, Tom McLean, and Marty Sigurdson authorized to attend.

Council approved the payment of \$428.74 to NRG Signs, Inc. for signage at the Kenton Multicourt Project.

The municipality will support the Thunder and Ice Snowmobile club with a donation of \$200 for signage.

Construction of the Elkhorn RTM child-care facility will be reaching substantial completion after Oct. 10 and insurance for the project will be transferred to the RM at that time. Council approved the twelfth progress payment of \$227,058.39 to JQ Built for the work completed up to Aug. 31, 2024.

#### COUNCILLOR REPORTS

Coun. Mark Humphries reported that all the plans have been finalized for the renovation of the Virden library, and tender can now be requested for the work there.

Coun. Cheryl Kleemola has resigned from the McAuley library board, and the position will be filled temporarily by Coun. Marla Dyke.

Coun. Lyle Kinnaird attended a handi-van

meeting and said most of the government funding has been received. The van has passed safety and is approved for use.

Coun. Val Caldwell said that Prairie Gateway Tourism has accepted the resignation of the Elkhorn Chamber of Commerce. The organization is looking for representatives from Elkhorn, Kenton and the municipality at large. The bank account balance for the organization is \$13,723,25.

The tourism committee is considering some winter photo shoots taking pictures of seasonal activities like the Lenore bonspiel, "because it's such an old building, and it's kind of like a historical thing and...if we're going to promote outdoor activities, we have to promote something that people can do," said Caldwell.

Caldwell also attended the Hamiota Healthy Stakeholders meeting and reported that a new organization, the Hamiota and Area Community Alliance is being organized

The clinic currently has 4.2 full-time physicians with Dr. Laurel Stevenson starting in the new year as well as a potential fifth physician. The facility still lacks a lab and x-ray technician and there are several positions to fill in nursing,

Hamiota's senior housing still has a waiting list of 12 people in a facility with 29 suites. Caldwell said, "Prairie Mountain Health made it very clear they will not be increasing the beds in Hamiota for seniors."












## Purple Thursday is an opportunity to help

Traumatic brain injury can change your life. Royal Purple wants to help those who have survived brain injury as a result of intimate partner violence on the upcoming Purple Thursday.

Purple Thursday, the third Thursday in October, is a special day of connection between the Canadian Royal Purple, communities and women's shelters across Canada. The Canadian Royal Purple adopted brain injury awareness and prevention as their official cause some years ago and have found that brain injury can have many different sources but is all too often a part of intimate partner violence.

You don't need to be knocked unconscious to suffer a brain injury. Intimate partner violence traumatic brain injuries (IPV-TBI) can occur due to a blow to head, face, neck or a sudden jarring or shaking.

Some 75 per cent of IPV survivors evaluated in emergency depart-

ments and shelters say they have experienced a TBI. Choking or strangling can cause brain injury.

Common physical symptoms include headaches, pressure, dizziness, nausea, blurred vision, sensitivity to light/sound, lack of energy. It can also affect brain function causing memory issues, inability to learn information, trouble organizing tasks. The victim may feel overly emotional, easily upset, nervous or anxious. Healthy sleep patterns may be disrupted.

Some TBIs may be seen on a CT or MRI scan, but some concussions, for example, may not be easily discovered through tests.

Head trauma is all too common as women who do not want friends and family to know that they are being abused will cover their faces, leaving their heads open to significant trauma.

Oct. 17 is Purple Thursday, and Virden's Royal Purple will assemble and deliver care bags for those fleeing violence, as well as for their children.

As their ongoing yearly project, the Royal Purple helps to raise awareness and funds for traumatic brain injury. Intimate partner violence falls within this mandate.
